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Deseret First Book - Deseret alphabet

The Deseret alphabet (/dɛɹzəˈrɛtɪ/; Deseret: 𐒃𐒅𐒇𐒉𐒋𐒍𐒏𐒑𐒓𐒕𐒗𐒙𐒛𐒝𐒟𐒡𐒣𐒥𐒧𐒩𐒫𐒭𐒮𐒰𐒲𐒴𐒶𐒸𐒺𐒼𐒿 or 𐒃𐒅𐒇𐒉𐒋𐒍𐒏𐒑𐒓𐒕𐒗𐒙𐒛𐒝𐒟𐒡𐒣𐒥𐒧𐒩𐒫𐒭𐒮𐒰𐒲𐒴𐒶𐒸𐒺𐒼𐒿) is a phonemic English-language spelling reform developed between 1847 and 1854 by the board of regents of the University of Deseret under the leadership of Brigham Young, the second president of The Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints (LDS Church).

The original Deseret alphabet had 40 letters; a copy of it was reproduced in an 1861 book in the AHC's Toppan Rare Books Library by Jules Remy called *Journey to Great Salt Lake City*. After slight revision to some of the letters, a 38-letter alphabet was used in three primers. The Toppan Library has copies of all three of these.

The Deseret First Book is one of four books published in the late 1860s in an alphabet created by the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints. The death of President Young in 1877 marked the end of efforts on its behalf. In Latter Day Saint lexicography, "deseret" is symbolic of the honeybee. Young claimed the alphabet was intended to replace the traditional Latin alphabet with an alternative, more phonetically accurate alphabet for the English language. This would offer immigrants an opportunity to learn to read and write English, he said, the orthography of which is often less phonetically consistent than those of many other ...

Rare Deseret Alphabet First Reader 1868 Brigham Young ...

The Deseret Alphabet came about on January 19, 1854 when the Board of Regents of the University of Deseret, now the University of Utah, announced that they had adopted a new phonetic alphabet. The new alphabet consisted of 38 to 40 characters and was developed mostly by George D. Watt. George D. Watt was on a committe called by President Brigham Young, second President of the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-day Saints, as part of a project to help simplify spelling in the English Language.

Deseret University regents published ten thousand copies of each of two textbooks, Deseret First Book and Deseret Second Book. In 1869, the year after the textbooks came into use, the transcontinental railroad was finished. The railroad brought many people into Utah who were not members of the Church, and interest in the alphabet project died. In the mid- to late-1800's there were only four books printed in the Deseret Alphabet. There were three children's readers (The first two readers were based on Willson's Readers, and the third was a partial Book of Mormon containing 1Nephi through Words of Mormon.), and the complete Book of Mormon.

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
