Synchronicity is a concept, first introduced by analytical psychologist Carl Jung, which holds that events are "meaningful coincidences" if they occur with no causal relationship yet seem to be meaningfully related. During his career, Jung furnished several different definitions of the term, defining synchronicity as an "acausal connecting principle;" "meaningful coincidence;" "acausal parallelism;" and as a "meaningful coincidence of two or more events where something other than the probability

Jung defined a synchronicity as meaningful and causally related correlations between outer (physical) and inner (mental) events. A good shorthand is meaningful coincidence. The coincidence is between external events and inner meaning that matches those events in some way or was inspired by them.

Jung's take on acausality can be confusing. When consciously recognized by the ego, synchronicity is supposedly an "acausal connecting principle." But Jung also says that the archetypes, as primordial patterns of the collective unconscious, direct us to the experience of synchronicity.

Jung variously described synchronicity as an "acausal connecting principle" (i.e., a pattern of connection that cannot be explained by conventional, efficient causality), "meaningful coincidence" and "acausal parallelism".

Carl Jung and Synchronicity

One of the methods that Jung believes allows the communication between the conscious and unconscious mind is the observation of synchronous events. It is Jung's work on Synchronicity that is the focus of Ira Progoff's 1973 work, Jung, Synchronicity, And Human Destiny. Synchronicity is defined as the occurrence of a meaningful coincidence.
