On what we might call the "Herder view," unconscious thoughts are inaccessible because not linguistically articulated (20-21). Finally, on Freud's view, unconscious mental states are inaccessible because repressed (21) -- but note that this is compatible with them being conceptually articulated (a point to which we will return).

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
